

Usually her day would begin at 4:30 or 5:00 A.M. and sometimes go as late as 9:00 or 10:00 P.M. just to prepare special things for her boys.

Her fairness and equality to all will always be remembered by those who worked under her and by those campers and counsellors who would try for extra favors such as waiting at the kitchen door in anticipation of a slice of her delicious home made bread, fresh out of the old wood range, only to be told that when favors are to be given everyone will benefit.

Let us all remember this exceptional woman in our prayers that she may soon enjoy the highest rewards of heaven.





Those who did not come last year,





SAILING PROGRAM TO BE INAGURATED



The sailing program like all other activities in camp will be based on a progressive system. The steps will be ABLE SEAMAN, SECOND CLASS SKIPPER, FIRST CLASS SKIPPER, BOATSVAIN'S MATE, AND BOATSVAIN.

If you are an Iriquois or a Sioux (11 to 16 years) you can qualify for sailing instruction in our new \$600 X boat beautifully rigged and equipped with nilon sails, providing that you have passed your Red Cross Intermediates Swimmer's test.





Fun will not be missing from their program either as they will have special activities as a group together. On yes, then there are a few small jobs to compensate for a part of the camp tuition. The C.T.C. program will give you younger campers something additional to work for. Plans at present are to start out with a selected group of seven or eight, and as time goes on expand it as its popularity grows. To be eligible a boy must be at least fifteen and have been a camper at F.F.C. or elsewhere.




