OUTDOOR EDUCATION - A NEW MILESTONE

At Camp Foley in the Spring of 1971 the first "live-in" Outdoor Education Program in the State of Minnesota took place. Sixth grade students from four St. Paul Parochial Schools participated in this pilot project. With improved material from the pilot project and the development of a student workbook and teachers' guide, the New Ulm parochial schools completed a most successful program of Outdoor Education at Camp Foley in the fall of 1971. At present, the Camp Foley Outdoor Education Program has been approved as part of the official curriculum of three Minnesota Dioceses: New Ulm, St. Cloud, and St. Paul-Minneapolis. Public school districts are now interested in what we have.

For 1972 we have four weeks scheduled before and five weeks after the regular season for Outdoor Education. Sixth grade students study the animal kingdom, botany, water biology, rocks and minerals, weather and conservation, field math, boat and water safety in the course of a school week. Spring - Mark Norman and Bob Mc Cormick - Fall - Paul Moudry and Dan Schmid, as core staff assisted the teachers from participating schools and high school students.

Echo Lake has become the main resource area for the program. Trips to the gravel pit and the Pequot Lakes Conservation Station and Forest Ranger Tower are intriguing learning experiences.





Fred spent many years at camp as a camper, C.I.T., junior counselor, and the last two years as a member of our senior staff. He will be remembered most by his pleasant smile and cheerful disposition. Bob Mc Cormick attends graduate school at Colorado State and was **shar**ing a mobile home in the mountains with Fred.

STAFF NEWS




About this time of the year winter begins to seem a little bng. All the more reason why the thought of another camping experience, now that the weather has taken a big change for the better, takes on a very special meaning.

IMPORTANT NOTICE-LIFE JACKETS

The new Minnesota Waters and Watercraft Safety Laws provide that every person on board a watercraft shall wear or have readily accessible to him on board the watercraft for his personal use a lifesaving device of the sort approved by the U.S. Coast Guard.

In the past, only those who could not pass the minimum swimming requirement had to wear life jackets since qualified lifeguards always accompanied our campers.

Under the new regulation each person must have his own life jacket on a watercraft, eventhough they are good swimmers and properly supervised.

If you have an approved device, bring it to camp with you; if not the camp will have them for sale at approximately five to six dollars.
